Baptized

And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Go, therefore, and make disciples of all the nations, <u>baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit</u>, teaching them to follow all that I commanded you; and behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." MATTHEW 28:18-20

We will hold a service of baptism on May 29 as several youth respond to Christ's call to "Follow Me."

Do you remember when you were baptized? I was baptized in 1999 after encountering Jesus in a service at the Assembly of God on Chiques Hill in Columbia. After deciding to follow Jesus, I met with the pastor and we set a date to be baptized in the Susquehanna as one of our members had a property in Wrightsville that sat along the river. The man on the left,

Huey, came alongside me, prayed with me, and helped make my decision definitive to follow Jesus. Pastor Bob, the man on the right, prayed over me with some other brothers the same day. Family members, brothers and sisters in Christ were in attendance and we shared a meal after.

In the Church of the Brethren, we wait to baptize until a person is able to decide for themselves. According to brethren.org, "Jesus invites us to baptize one another as a marker along our journey of following him. Being baptized in public celebrates that we have received God's forgiveness. Baptism


symbolizes our participation in the church, the body of Christ, the ways we share in what God is doing in the world through our gifts, talents, and whole life."

Jesus was baptized by John the Baptist (Matt. 3:13-17; Mark 1:9-11; Luke 3:21-22; John 1:29-34). Jesus' disciples baptized others (John 3:1-3; Acts 8:34-

40; Acts 10:44-48, etc) and Paul was baptized in Acts 9:18.


Though it may be an individual decision to be baptized, baptism is a public declaration and event as he or she is welcomed into a worldwide, multigenerational, community of believers.

Baptism represents a new birth, a washing away of sins into a new life with Jesus Christ (John 3:1-21; Rom. 6:3-4; Acts 22:16).



For those new to the faith, this can be a scary step, causing anxiety or many questions to rise. To help answer some of those and ease some of this anxiety, I encourage you to

share your baptism story: when did you decide? When and where were you baptized and by whom? Have you participated in baptizing anyone? How did that go? ***One note: if you were baptized as an infant, but never made a public declaration of your faith to those around you and would like to do so, please contact Pastor Doug.

The apostle Paul opens this section imploring the Ephesian church to walk in a worthy manner of their call and later says, "Therefore, laying aside falsehood, speak truth each one *of you* with his neighbor, <u>for we are members of one another</u>." It seems the things that divide the church today are nothing new: politics, socio-economic class, ethnicity, nationality, political party or affiliation...just to name a few. Yet, Paul uses the word "one" seven times in three verses to remind the church who they are and whose they are. Do we need those reminders today? Acts 16:22-40

Matthew 9:9-13, Matthew 8:5-13

Imagine starting any initiative with an IRS agent, a construction worker, and a member of the Proud Boys. Then imagine who you go to help. Not the people in your neighborhood or your church or even your family or friends but the poor, the homeless, the sick, the hopeless, and those whose morals are questionable. That's exactly who Jesus and his disciples sought out to help. Jesus healed the sick, delivered those who were oppressed by demons and by other people, challenged the authorities and traditions, and taught that God loved everyone. His disciples carried the mission "to the ends of the earth" and began a movement that challenged conventional thinking whose influence has been passed down from generation to generation.

Imagine that we, as part of Christ's Body, put aside our differences and focused on what we have in common. That no matter what our differences might be, that we were united in a single purpose. That we understood and were unafraid to share God's message and the way of living that he designed and that Christ taught us how to live. Imagine that we unbridled ourselves from the messages and strategies of the world and that, yoked to Jesus, we went into the neighborhoods and shared the Good News! What's keeping you from doing that? What might you try to get unstuck? What's more important?


