TRUST & LOVE IN THE MIDST OF CHANGE

"When he had finished washing their feet, he put on his clothes and returned to his place. "Do you understand what I have done for you?" he asked them. "You call me 'Teacher' and 'Lord,' and rightly so, for that is what I am. Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you.

"A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another.""

JOHN 13:12-15, 34-35

Do you remember being trained on the job? It may have been your first job or the career you're in now (or from which you retired). Typically, there's an educational piece: learning technology, terminology, processes, chain of command, or work flow. There's often a piece where a co-worker or supervisor comes alongside you to answer

questions, clarify things not in the educational piece, and model expectations of the company. So often, we carry a nervous excitement: do I have what it takes? Can I help this company succeed, make a living wage for me and/or my family, and work well with those around me and honor God through this work? But then, there comes a day when training is over and we're set out on our own. We are equipped and entrusted to do our part to

meet customer needs, promote the company that employs us, and maybe train a new team member. Even when we have work rhythms and patterns down, things can change: new boss, company buyout, updated technology. We enter a new learning curve and so long as everyone does their part, the company moves forward.

Jesus shared the words above to His disciples after the Last Supper, after He told them about the Temple being destroyed, after He predicted His death and resurrection. Everything they knew from childhood with the temple and the One they trusted for the last three years was about to be removed. How does He prepare them for the next steps as

things looked uncertain? "A

new command I give you:
Love one another. As I
have loved you, so you
must love one another."
Put first things first: "Love
one another...as I have
loved you." Did they trust
Jesus' word? Yes, without
which we may not be here
today.

As change and 'the new' comes, if we continue to love one another as Christ loves us and trust His Word, no matter the change, we will see His Glory revealed and His Kingdom come. World Wide Communion/Love Feast **Conduct Consistent with Christ**

Philippians 1:27 - 2:11

Last week, Paul defined two groups of people: those who preach Christ with selfish intent and those who preach with a pure heart. He now turns to encouraging the body of Philippi on how to conduct themselves. A person recently told me, "Beware (be aware) of the spirit you bring." Sometimes in order to defend our faith to the world, we use weapons of the world: craft arguments, condescending tones, building camps around our ideologies. Yet, Paul says, "do not be alarmed....conduct yourselves in a manner worthy of the gospel."

We see culture wars in the church today over political ideology, gender, marriage, rights, freedom, race, and so on. What would it be like to conduct ourselves as Jesus? What did He do? How is He calling us now? Can our conduct be consistent with His? What shall we do?

Shining As Stars

Philippians 2:12-18

In many of our bibles, we see this passage of Scripture entitled "Shining as Stars." What does that mean to you? How can we shine like stars in this time that is seemingly dark? And yet, we are children of the light, whom Paul instructs to work out our very own salvation. What? What does that mean and how are we meant to accomplish it? It feels complicated but at the end of the day, Paul reminds us that we should rejoice with him. Let's explore his ideas together!

Whose Interests?

Philippians 2:19-30 **Pastor: Geoff Davis**

"For everyone looks out for his own interests, not those of Jesus Christ." (2:21) Paul is imprisoned and unable to leave, but he has companions with him looking out for his interests - Timothy and Epaphroditus. Timothy ("one who honors God") was a third-generation Christian who accompanied Paul and became his assistant on hi second missionary journey. Paul mentions that, as his spiritual father, Timothy is going into the family business with him. Epaphroditus ("lovely; handsome; charming) is a Philippian who was sent as a messenger by the church in Philippi to Paul in Rome, was homesick, and had almost died of an unnamed illness. Paul was "eager to send him" home.

Even though he's imprisoned, Paul is hopeful, focused on others' well-being, confident, "spared from sorrow upon sorrow," eager, and thankful. How is he able to maintain this way of seeing his world when faced with threats of death? Whose interests was he looking out for? How might we be able to learn an important lesson from his example?

It takes a community of believers to do the work of the church. Prayerfully consider how God wants you to serve the community at Hempfield Church of the Brethren. There are awesome Ministry Teams waiting for your help and input. When asked, seriously consider saying "YES, count me in!"

Ministry Teams

<u>The Stewardship of Financial Resources Team</u> administers the church's funds. The team is responsible to give financial counsel to the Leadership Team and build the annual budget, encourage good stewardship for congregation members, and oversee the work of the Treasurer, Financial Secretary and Recording Secretary.

<u>The Stewardship of Property Team</u> supervises the care, maintenance and development of the church's property. The team is the legal trustee of all property, buildings and other assets of the church and is responsible for acquiring, holding, and conveying property in accordance with the decisions of the Leadership Team and/or the Church Gathering.

<u>The Worship Team</u> coordinates the overall worship experience of the congregation in conjunction with the Pastors and music directors. The team educates and encourages the congregation regarding meaningful and inspirational worship, and explores new and innovative approaches to worship.

<u>The Education Team</u> administers the total Christian education program of the congregation with the objective of fostering continuous spiritual growth within its members. Some of the programs administered by the Education Team include Sunday school, vacation bible school, the church library, nursery and children's church.

<u>The Fellowship and Hospitality Team</u> develops and coordinates actions and events which promote the fellowship of members and promote the hospitality of visitors. Examples of some such events would be coffee and snacks for Sunday morning, the Church picnic and the Good Friday prayer breakfast.

<u>The Outreach Ministry Team</u> initiates, plans, and directs service and evangelistic opportunities, identifies, initiates, and maintains contact with persons in the mission field and community organizations, and provides training to prepare church members for outreach ministry. The Team also proposes an outreach ministry budget, collects funds, goods, and materials for service and evangelism opportunities at home and abroad and in particular encourages congregational support for the annual Disaster Relief Auction.

<u>The Spiritual Gifts Discernment Team</u> oversees the calling of people to fill positions for Congregational Gathering approval. Team members develop and administer a process for advising church attendees of opportunities for service within the organizational structure of the church.

<u>The Pastoral Relations Team</u> serve in maintaining good ministerial relations between the congregation and the pastors. Members are elected or appointed by various Teams and Pastors.

The Care of Church Community Team initiates, plans, and directs social events and functions to focus on the needs of the body such as: Support Groups (widow/widower, grief, single parent, etc.,); Church Retreat; Men's/Women's Retreat; Fellowship Events; Knit and crochet group; Explore Bus trips, discounted tickets to local events/amusement parks; Recruit volunteers for events i.e. Brethren Disaster Relief; Organize guess who's coming to Dinner, and other Fellowship events; other.



SEARCH COMMITTEE UPDATE:

The job title and description of the Director of Youth Ministry and Discipleship was approved on September 18th. The team will now complete a church profile before it can be posted within the Atlantic Northeast Distrct. The team plans to contact local colleges and seminaries to advertise. 
Nov. 27-Dec.18 ADVENT with JD Greear




Feb.26-Apr.2 Jesus' Farewell Message with Francis Chan

Nobody grows up dreaming of waking up, going to work, heading home, watching Netflix, scrolling through social media, and then doing it all over again the next day until their last breath. We all want to be used to change the world. We don't want to spend our lives being time-wasters, or space-takers, or binge-watchers, or game-players, or even book-readers. We want to be difference-makers. But it's easy to get caught up in the everyday stuff of life until the years slowly go by, and with each passing year, the question seems to get louder: *Am I making any difference in this world?* We want to make a difference, but there are so many opinions on the way to do that. Maybe there's a different way to make a difference, and we're just missing it. Without a doubt, Jesus is the person who has made the biggest difference in all of history. So, how did Jesus make such a difference in this world? If we study the story of his life as recorded in the Gospels, there are a number of answers we could highlight, but there's one particular phrase that captures how Jesus had such an impact, and this



phrase is how he wants to use us to make a difference: one at a time. Making a difference isn't measured by a viral post or a name on a building. It isn't determined by a following or a fan base. Making a difference isn't dependent on what's in your bank account or who's in your contacts. Want to make a difference? Focus on the one. That's it. That's the secret of the way of Jesus. One at a time.

Rebecca Dali is coming to Hempfield!

We have the great honor and privilege to have **Rebecca Dali**, originally from Nigeria, come to lead worship at Hempfield on **Sunday**, **October 23** at 9:30 am. Rebecca is founder of the Center for Caring, Empowerment and Peace Initiative (CCEPI). She will provide an update on the situation in Nigeria and how God is working through CCEPI to help the most vulnerable and marginalized people of Northern Nigeria. She will also share and answer questions during the Sunday School hour after church. **Don't miss this powerful event!**





Dr. Rebecca Dali, is Executive Director, Centre for Caring, Empowerment, and Peace Initiatives (CCEPI) established in 1989, Founder of Strategic Action for Community Development, Nigeria, 2017 recipient of the Sergio Vieira de Mello United Nations Humanitarian Award. In addition, She has multiple degrees, including a PhD from the University of Jos, and is the author of seven books and more than 10 articles. She has served as a scholar in residence at Elizabethtown College and Bridgewater College, and she has been lecturer and senior lecturer at the Theological College of Northern Nigeria and Kulp Theological Seminary.

Samuel Dali, her husband, had to cancel his trip and will not able to travel with Rebecca. He has a PhD and served as president of EYN-Church of the Brethren in Nigeria during Boko Haram crisis from 2011 to 2016. Dr. Dali has also served as scholar in residence at Elizabethtown College and Bethany Theological Seminary. He serves as a member of the board of CCEPI.

CCEPI is a non-profit organization in both Nigeria and the United States, and it provides care and aid to the most vulnerable persons who have been affected by disaster, violence, trauma, and devastation in many forms, including girls and women who have escaped from Boko Haram. Over 2 million people have been served by CCEPI.

Rebecca has a deep understanding of the social difficulties currently afflicting Nigeria. Rebecca's emphasis in her teaching is on a minimization of conflict, peaceful coexistence, and the importance of mutuality and interdependence. She dreams of a Nigeria where all people can live in peace and prosperity. She is able to share the deep challenges to relationship and understanding that Christians and Muslims face in Nigeria, particularly in the context of Boko Haram.

Rebecca will discuss the political and social disruptions in Nigeria today and CCEPI'S response, as well as plans for building a permanent physical facility for CCEPI. **Come for an inspiring morning!**

Christmas Shoeboxes for Romania My Brother's Keeper Ministry

We are helping children in Romania again this year by **assembling Christmas shoeboxes**. My Brother's Keeper (MBK) works with children, some in orphanages, throughout the year and provides a gift at Christmas. It is a great opportunity to share the Gospel with the kids. MBK's mission is to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ, assist the helpless and equip the younger generation to make good decisions for their lives.



The Avadanei family, Lucian, Rebecca and their kids, live and serve in Piatra Neamt, Romania. They came to Hempfield in March to share about their ministry. Rebecca grew up in Lancaster and went to high school at LMH. Rebecca and Lucian met while both serving in orphan ministry in 2012. They have been working through My Brother's Keeper since 2015, **distributing Christmas shoeboxes**, doing outreach for children & youth such as weekly kid's clubs, summer VBS & camps and English tutoring.

<u>WHAT TO PUT IN THE SHOEBOX:</u> Toys (small cars, balls, dolls, small stuffed animals, harmonicas, yo-yos, small Etch A Sketch®, Slinky, etc.), school supplies (pens, pencils & sharpener, crayons or markers, coloring books, writing pads or paper, calculators, etc.), other (hard candy, lollipops, mints, gum, ball caps, socks, T-shirts, hair clips, watches, small picture books, stickers.

<u>DO NOT INCLUDE</u>: Used or damaged items; food or chocolate; liquids or lotions; medications or vitamins.



<u>HOW TO WRAP THE PACKAGE</u>: Put everything in a shoebox (standard size) or a small plastic container. Wrap it as a gift and place a label on the outside of the package if it is for a boy or girl and the child's age category. Age categories: 2-4; 5-9; 10-14.

<u>SHIPPING:</u> Please donate \$6 or more with each package for shipping & customs charges. It is important for each of the box to get to Romania. You can write a check to My Brother's Keeper (note "Christmas shoeboxes" on memo line) and place it in an envelope on top of the gift box. If you are preparing more than one shoe box, please make one combined donation. (Please do not put the money inside the box and then wrap the box.) Your whole family can participate in this great ministry. **Please place completed boxes under the table in the narthex by Sunday, October 9.** Thanks for helping to brighten a child's life!
