

## Count well the **Cost**

“Suppose one of you wants to build a tower. Won't you first sit down and estimate the cost to see if you have enough money to complete it? For if you lay the foundation and are not able to finish it, everyone who sees it will ridicule you, saying, 'This person began to build and wasn't able to finish.'”

In the same way, those of you who do not give up everything you have cannot be my disciples.”

**Luke 14:28-30, 33**

Alexander Mack, Sr. penned a hymn, “Count well the cost.” The first verse states, ““Count well the cost,” Christ Jesus says, “when you lay the foundation.” Are you resolved, though all seem lost, to risk your reputation, your self, your wealth, for Christ the Lord as you now give your solemn word?” This hymn, inspired by the Scripture above, acknowledges what it means to follow Jesus: it is both free to follow and yet, costs you everything you are, have, and will become. Do you understand this?

We need not live in the fear of men, but need to be sober about following Jesus. When our jobs or work ask us to participate in something that contradicts the Gospel, whether uneven scales or some social practice, do we speak up out of conviction or shrink back out of fear? When friends spew hate, do we teach and show them another way? Are we willing to break family chains, even if that means bringing sin out into the light or acknowledging the fear and shame that has been carried by individuals, in order to live a healthier, Christ-like way forward? Are we willing to name the justice of God in the face of an unfair and unjust world? What have you risked for your faith, for Christ?

I listen to the rhetoric of brothers and sisters who tie their faith to their political party, so that their gospel message and the tone it's shared in reflect their political leaders over Jesus.

If you cannot separate your political party, your personal views, your family values from that of Jesus and allow all of those to come in alignment with Him, you may want to check who carries the greatest weight in your life. We are here to represent and reflect Christ in all areas of life, and this means checking all of our strongest convictions against His teachings and way.

You know, I watched the news around the Catholic school shooting the other week, the fact that the shooter shot from the outside in, killing children attending a mass. One thing we used to hear a lot and are now hearing less and less, “I never thought *that* could happen here.” The first thing that came to my mind was our body of believers. Can we follow Jesus, praying for those who persecute us and blessing those who hate us? If and when the day comes, can we stare death in the face, knowing that Jesus did the same, seeking forgiveness for the very people who put Him on the cross? Hebrews 2:14-15 says, “Therefore, since the children share in flesh and blood, He Himself likewise also partook of the same, that through death He might render powerless him who had the power of death, that is, the devil, and might free those who through fear of death were subject to slavery all their lives.”

**Count the cost.** Know that we can be free of the fear of death. Pray, when the time comes, your strength is supplied by the Lord. **Pastor Doug**

## Where do you best hear from God?

If I had to guess, we all have a space that is our respite from the world. A place of quiet or meaning that helps us center ourselves and be still. For some of us, it might be our favorite chair in a quiet corner of the living room where we go to pray and read our Bible each morning. For others, it is found on a hiking trail or with a mountain view. It might be on a run, or on a motorcycle winding its way along a country road. If you've never taken time to sit at our pavilion on a quiet afternoon, I highly recommend it. Often the breeze that blows down the hill feels like the breath of God if you pause long enough.



But for me, like many others, I find respite near water. Ironically, water represents chaos in the Jewish tradition. Think of the disciples on the stormy water with Jesus. Several of them were seasoned fishermen who well knew what the Sea of Galilee was like. Yet, when a storm blew up, they were terrified and begged Jesus to save their lives. I can't say that I blame them as I'm not a fan of being *in* the water myself. But *next* to it? Yes, please.

Given a choice, I love to sit near the ocean but since we are not especially near that, I often pause to sit near Lake Placida on the campus of Elizabethtown College. Perhaps it reminds me of the sweet moments (and hard work!) spent there during my undergrad years but sitting there often provides clarity that feels directly inspired by the Holy Spirit.

And that's where I found myself a about a week ago. I was wrestling with a project, processing the emotional impact of this summer both personally and from a ministry perspective, and frankly, I was just feeling sad about the state of the world. I went specifically hoping for a word from the Lord. Perhaps even demanding.

I sat on my preferred bench. Nothing.

I took a walk around the lake and prayed. Nothing.

I sat on a different bench. Still nothing.

It seemed that there was not a bird in the water, a breath of fresh air, and even the lake looked bleak since rain has been scarce and all the brush on the banks had been clear cut.

Frustrated, I stood up and then I saw it. There, at my feet, perched on a reed which dipped into the murky water was a beautiful butterfly. A beautiful God wink.

God wasn't absent. I just needed to change my posture so I could receive.

We live in a noisy world that moves at an astonishing pace. We are constantly receiving and processing a level of information that was unthinkable even thirty years ago. The way we do everything is completely different now. And if we're not careful, it's easy to lose sight of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ in the chaos.

Through the Psalmist, we are reminded this: “Be still and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted on the earth.” (Psalm 46:10 NIV) The HCSB translation says it this way: “Stop your fighting...” We are not talking about fighting with other people. No, the psalmist is talking about fighting with ourselves. God himself is saying relax! Let go! Allow yourself to be weak! Cease your striving!



### Modeling and Teaching the Kingdom

Psalm 113, Isaiah 53, 1 Corinthians 11 (dramatically read), Luke 22:14-30

When inviting people into the Kingdom of Heaven, the reign of God, we make it our aim to carry a consistent character through our words and our actions. This World Communion Sunday, we begin our monthly theme of Modeling and Teaching the Kingdom of God: it's not enough that we only speak the Kingdom or only model the Kingdom, but that both our speech and actions come under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. We aim to be consistent as Christ's character remains consistent. Today, we structure our service to model and teach on the Lord's Supper. What did Jesus do this night before His crucifixion? Why was it important? What really mattered as He faced His imminent death? What does this mean for us today?



## Featured Hymn Writer

November 2025

The hymn writer for the month of October is CHARLES WESLEY. He was born in Lincolnshire, England in 1707, the 18<sup>th</sup> of 19 children, and went home to the Lord in 1788. He probably comes in second only to Fanny Crosby in the number of hymns written, with a total of 6,500 created, some in partnership with two of his sons, others along with his brother. He, along with his brother, John, were the co-founders of the Methodist movement.

Charles graduated from Christ Church College in Oxford where he founded what was nick-named the Holy Club. Among the membership of his club was a future well-known missionary by the name of George Whitefield. Charles was ordained both priest and deacon in 1735, and soon after, he left for Georgia to follow in his friend's footsteps in America. From the start, he was influenced primarily by the Anglican church and its method of evangelizing. He wasn't very successful in this work in Georgia, but he remained there for six months where he also acted as secretary to James Oglethorpe, considered to be the founder of Georgia.

Upon returning to England, he became part of the "Circuit Riders", a group of evangelists who traveled by horseback to inspire and carry the gospel to ordinary folks and provide for their spiritual growth in their faith journey. He continued this work for 17 years. At some point during this period, he married Sarah Gynne and became the father of 8 children, only 3 of whom lived to adulthood. He had become impressed by the Moravians in America, in particular by a man named Peter Bohler. This man was likely responsible for Charles' conversion at Pentecost in 1738. His preaching was referred to often as "thunder and lightning". Perhaps that was the reason he fell into ill health and depression in his later years.

It wasn't until 1780 that he comprised the hymn collection for Methodists, despite the fact that his brother John was considered to be the founder of this denomination as early as 1729. The Methodists rejected the Calvinist idea of predestination, and instead followed the concept of salvation through faith and grace. They also focus on social reforms and mission work, and the Salvation Army was actually started by a Methodist minister.

Charles moved to London in 1771 where he served as superintendent at City Road Chapel. He and his sons continued to write and compile hymns for the Methodist Hymnal for even more years. He authored the following hymns we know and sing, plus many more: "Christ the Lord is Risen Today", "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing", "Love Divine, All Love Excelling", "Ye Servants of God", "And Can It Be", "Jesus, Lover of My Soul", "Soldiers of Christ", "Oh for a Thousand Tongues to Sing".

Part of your preparation for service includes participation in an orientation unit, lasting a week and a half. With this group of 1030 people, you will examine issues related to service, personal and spiritual growth, group living, adjustment to new situations, simple living and cross-cultural sensitivity.

The art of serving is a process of both giving and receiving. The hope that this art will move beyond a one to two year program and will become a lifestyle.

You are encouraged to participate in a local faith community as you serve in BVS.





Are you familiar with RightNow Media? It is a wonderful resource for Bible Studies and other materials. The church has a membership for their site and you can have access to it as well. If you'd like the information of how you can access all of this information, see Pastor Doug for login information.



**Tithe.ly**

Tithe.ly (formerly Breeze) is our online church management database. You can (and should) have your own login to the system that will allow you to have access to contact information for our church community and to keep your own

information active and current. To create your own account, simply visit the church website at [www.hempfieldcob.org](http://www.hempfieldcob.org) and click on the Member's Directory link at the top of the page. If you already have an account and password, you can log in from there. At the bottom of that screen you'll see a place to "create an account". Follow that link to set yourself up – easy as that!. Once your account is created, you will see several tabs across the top of the page – go to the one that says "my profile". That will show you what is already loaded into Breeze for you and will give you the place to edit any incorrect information. In addition, if you'd like to have ready access to Tithe.ly from your smart phone, simply go to the App Store on your phone and download the Tythe.ly app and download the church app.. You will then be able to log into information at your fingertips. If you have questions, contact Irene in the church office.

- On the front page you will see scrolling pictures of different upcoming events and other fun times in the life of the church.
- You can follow the tabs on the top of the page to all of our social media platforms where things are posted regularly.
- There is basic information about our church.
- The "Events" tab will lead you directly to the church calendar so you can know many of the meetings and events happening in the life of the church. If you have church-wide events that you'd like added to the calendar, contact Irene in the church office.
- The center of the main page gives the church's vision statement and the pane to the left will give you the title of the upcoming service and a place to access the past services.
- If you click on "Our Church" you can find all kinds of information about our ministries and staff. There is also a link under that tab that says "Sermons". There you will find the YouTube videos of past services. The most recent service is typically posted there early in the week following.
- The "Donate" tab takes you directly to screen to be able to give directly online. The dropdown box will allow you to also designate what fund you want that donation to go to.
- The last tab at the top of the page, "This Sunday" takes you to the information and downloadable version of the bulletin for the upcoming service.
- Near the bottom of the page, there are scrolling boxes that highlight other happenings in the life of HCOB. If you click on any of the boxes it will give you update information and registration links. The Herald box will give you links to the most current and previous two issues of the newsletter.
- Basic directions and contact information can be found at the very bottom of the page.

The website is a wonderful resource for much of the information you need to know about what is happening at HCOB!!
