

## THY Kingdom Come and *we bow down*

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord, high and exalted, seated on a throne; and the train of his robe filled the temple. Above him were seraphim, each with six wings: With two wings they covered their faces, with two they covered their feet, and with two they were flying. And they were calling to one another:

**“Holy, holy, holy is the Lord Almighty; the whole earth is full of his glory.”**

**At the sound of their voices the doorposts and thresholds shook and the temple was filled with smoke.**

**“Woe to me!” I cried. “I am ruined! For I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips, and my eyes have seen the King, the Lord Almighty.”**

**Isaiah 6:1-5**

Whenever the living creatures give glory, honor and thanks to him who sits on the throne and who lives for ever and ever, the twenty-four elders fall down before him who sits on the throne and worship him who lives for ever and ever. They lay their crowns before the throne and say:

**“You are worthy, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honor and power, for you created all things, and by your will they were created and have their being.”**

**Revelation 4:9-11**

We bring our series of “The Kingdom of God” to a close this month. As we look at the Scriptures above, we see Isaiah confess not only his sin, but the sins of his countrymen, in an act of awe, fear, and humility. We see the throne again in our passage from Revelation. At the sound and worship of the living creatures, the twenty-four elders bow low, laying their crowns before the Lamb of God. The Kingdom of God is one of power in humility, service in love, truth spoken in grace, holiness in the midst of the corrupt and dark. Markers of this Kingdom remain: joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Through this past year, we’ve looked at parables of the Kingdom, disciplines and gifts in the Kingdom, and inviting people into the Kingdom. Through the summer, we took an assessment of our Spiritual Gifts, recognizing that mercy, service, and shepherding are our top three as a body. With that knowledge...

We will move into next year with a preaching theme of “Sharing your Story of Faith.” Within our gift set, how do we communicate the story of Christ in our lives? Where do we do this? With whom? What shapes our demeanor? How did Jesus and the disciples share their faith with those around them? How was it modeled? What role does the Bible and the Biblical accounts play in our own sharing? There’s no other way to see true peace, true life come to this earth unless we learn to live as Kingdom people and communicate that people to others through action and word. We are already beginning to see the harvest come forth – let’s go out and get some more!

*“The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned.” Isaiah 9:2*

As we approach the end of the calendar year, we find light at a premium. The sun rises later each morning and sets earlier each afternoon. It's position on the horizon is low. It is at this time that one might find oneself both coming and going in darkness. And yet, it was into a similarly dark world that God sent the promise and hope of a new future for his people.

For centuries, God's people have been people of light, nightly lighting simple oil lamps, certainly to see but also as a reminder of God's provision. He lit their way through the wilderness. He provided oil for the widow who had nothing left. And even in the darkness of the intertestamental period, with silent voice, he was steadily lighting up the world, inch by inch. Promise by promise. All with a whisper of something new.

We welcome in the Advent season not as a few calendar weeks with which to complete our holiday tasks but rather because we, too, are people of the light. Advent, it seems, means “coming” or “arrival” and it is in these days that we celebrate the light that Jesus brought into the world through his humble birth in Bethlehem, his presence with us now through the Holy Spirit, the helper, who dwells within believers, and the promise of his future return in glory.

So many years ago, God's people groaned in unrest and uncertainty. Their world was messy and oppressive. They looked for a mighty warrior to save them as the prophets had promised. The world, however, missed the whimper of a tiny babe born to set them free. In the darkness they were blinded to a new possibility. To the idea that God's ways were quite different than worldly expectations. That God was doing something new and wholly unexpected.

If we're honest, our world is not so very different than the world two thousand years ago. My challenge to you is this—in this season of hustle and indifference, of family and frenzy, of hope and also pain, would you purpose to slow down? A candle doesn't stay lit when we are running through the world with it. If a candle is to stay lit, it needs to be still. Purpose to pause. To be still. Call on the Lord and trust that he will show up. That he will speak to your heart. And there shall be joy in the morning.

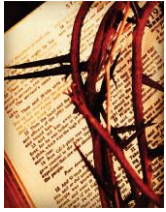

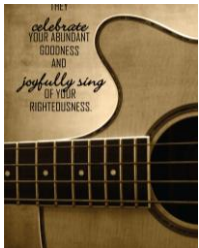
## **He is Here! We Come to Worship**

## Featured Hymn Writer

December 2025

### CELEBRATING CLASSIC CHRISTMAS CAROL COMPOSERS

Issac Watts and Henry Wadsworth Longfellow

Watts was an English hymnwriter, minister and theologian who penned more than 700 hymns, including one of the most beloved carols throughout the entire world. Few exist who have never sung "Joy to the World". In addition, he also wrote "At the Cross", "Am I a Soldier of the Cross", "Jesus Shall Reign, Wher'ere the Sun", "Oh God Our Help in Ages Past", "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross", and a multitude of other hymns sung to this day. Born in 1674, he was known for educational works on logic, grammar, philosophy and astronomy. He was also a dissenter, a protestant who disagreed with the doctrines and practices of the Church of England, as was his father, who was a clothier, jailed for his dissenting beliefs. Strongly influenced by his father, he served as a pastor for most of his life, beginning at Mark Lane Chapel in London in 1702. Gifted from childhood, he mastered Latin, Greek and French by age 16. Later challenged by his father to improve congregational singing which often lacked passion and expression, he adapted the Psalms to worship to make them comprehensible and emotional for all people of the day. A single man, in 1712, he was overtaken by chronic illness and eventually taken in and cared for by close family friends till he passed away years later in 1748. An enormous list of hymns he wrote are still used in church hymnals today.

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow was born in Portland, Maine in 1807 and passed away in 1882. Poet, educator and linguist, he became the most famous poet in the 19<sup>th</sup> century. He graduated from Portland Academy, traveled extensively throughout Europe and later taught at Bowdoin College. Two of his most famous poems still taught in schools today are "Evangeline" and "Paul Revere's Ride". He was known for his translations of European literature, such as Dante's and Goethe's, into English. He was a nature lover and beauty and sentiment were traditional themes in his poetry. Prose writing included "The Courtship of Miles Standish" and "Hyperion". Influenced by Wordsworth and Samuel Taylor Coleridge and inspired by Romantic poetry of his day, he coined many expressions we still make use of today, like "ships that pass in the night". He was a classmate of Hawthorne and taught Thoreau at Harvard later in his career. Sadly, his life turned tragic when he lost his wife in a house fire in 1861, and two years afterward, also lost his son from Civil War injuries. Soon afterward, his health began to decline, and upon his death years later, he was mourned by millions throughout not only America, but the world. One of our most beloved Christmas carols, "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day", written on Christmas Day in 1863 in remembrance of both his wife and son, was adapted from Longfellow's poem and set to music by John Calkin.

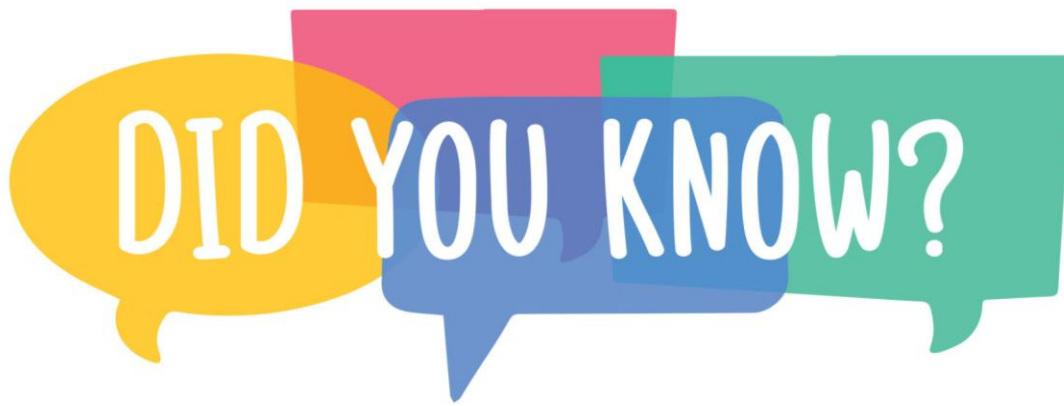

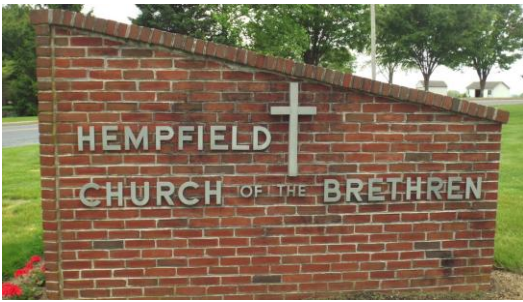


**Tithe.ly**

Tithe.ly (formerly Breeze) is our online church management database. You can (and should) have your own login to the system that will allow you to have access to contact information for our church community and to keep your own

information active and current. To create your own account, simply visit the church website at [www.hempfieldcob.org](http://www.hempfieldcob.org) and click on the Member's Directory link at the top of the page. If you already have an account and password, you can log in from there. At the bottom of that screen you'll see a place to "create an account". Follow that link to set yourself up – easy as that!. Once your account is created, you will see several tabs across the top of the page – go to the one that says "my profile". That will show you what is already loaded into Breeze for you and will give you the place to edit any incorrect information. In addition, if you'd like to have ready access to Tithe.ly from your smart phone, simply go to the App Store on your phone and download the Tythe.ly app and download the church app.. You will then be able to log into information at your fingertips. If you have questions, contact Irene in the church office.

- On the front page you will see scrolling pictures of different upcoming events and other fun times in the life of the church.
- You can follow the tabs on the top of the page to all of our social media platforms where things are posted regularly.
- There is basic information about our church.
- The "Events" tab will lead you directly to the church calendar so you can know many of the meetings and events happening in the life of the church. If you have church-wide events that you'd like added to the calendar, contact Irene in the church office.
- The center of the main page gives the church's vision statement and the pane to the left will give you the title of the upcoming service and a place to access the past services.
- If you click on "Our Church" you can find all kinds of information about our ministries and staff. There is also a link under that tab that says "Sermons". There you will find the YouTube videos of past services. The most recent service is typically posted there early in the week following.
- The "Donate" tab takes you directly to screen to be able to give directly online. The dropdown box will allow you to also designate what fund you want that donation to go to.
- The last tab at the top of the page, "This Sunday" takes you to the information and downloadable version of the bulletin for the upcoming service.
- Near the bottom of the page, there are scrolling boxes that highlight other happenings in the life of HCOB. If you click on any of the boxes it will give you update information and registration links. The Herald box will give you links to the most current and previous two issues of the newsletter.
- Basic directions and contact information can be found at the very bottom of the page.

The website is a wonderful resource for much of the information you need to know about what is happening at HCOB!!
